The 2022 Financial Year began much like the previous year with Covid-19 a constant presence and everyone in the sport having to navigate traffic light settings and what that meant for us all.

Thankfully that is largely behind us now, albeit with Covid-19 still being an active illness in our communities. What that meant for our sport was a lack of summer netball in late 2021 and early 2022, impacting our participation numbers.

All of our Centres did an amazing job to get back into netball when they could, and this did mean being able to complete a full season right through to the end of the year. 2023 is looking equally as promising and our collective aim is to get participation numbers back to the levels of 2019 and grow from there.

The ANZ Premiership in 2022 was a start stop affair with Covid-19 first requiring games to be played with only very small crowds and then teams being directly impacted forcing the postponement of a number of matches. For the MG Mystics it was a year that promised so much but ultimately led to a third place finish. The season started with three players unavailable for the first match and then injury and further illness stopping our charge towards the grand final. We admired and acknowledged the grit and resilience shown by the team in response to the disruption experienced.

We farewelled MG Mystics Head Coach, Helene Wilson after 6 years with the Zone and Mystics. Helene's dedication, commitment, and unwavering desire to make the Mystics the best possible team was outstanding. More importantly Helene was driven to make the people within the team the best they can be – not just players but all the support staff as well. We were delighted to appoint Tia Winikerei, another Northern Zone grown talent into the Head Coach role, to build on the legacy left by Helene.

The Northern Marvels had a similarly disrupted season with Covid-19 decimating the squad at various times through the season. This made it difficult to build combinations and put out good performances on court.

The introduction of the Mystics Men and Stars Men invitational matches was also well received. This was the first step in trying to increase the awareness and exposure for the men's game in our Zone. We hope to continue this process in 2023. It is great to see a number of Centres also offering boys and men's competitions throughout the season.

We were pleased to get the Centre Advisory Group underway and we thank those Centre representatives who participated in the various discussions. At a governance level we were able to bring together the Centre Board Chairs to share knowledge and information with each other. Both of these activities will continue in 2023 as we look to strengthen our relationship and way of working with each Centre.

Congratulations to the Howick Pakuranga Netball Centre for hosting a very successful UNISS tournament in late August, early September. The commitment of the staff and volunteers at the Centre along with the organising committee was wonderful to see. I know the participants enjoyed a fantastic week of competitive netball.

The Manurewa Netball Centre completed the installation of a cover for three of their netball courts with the official opening held in early August. Congratulations on this excellent facility that is now available for the Manurewa community and visitors.

FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

The net surplus for the year was \$86,385 (2021: \$104,099), improving our equity to \$157,087 (2021: \$70,702) as at 30 November 2022. It has been another positive year financially and has enabled the equity position to return to a more satisfactory level.

Whilst we were impacted by Covid restrictions which limited revenue from Mystics home matches, this was largely offset by a growth in sponsorship revenue. If home game revenue returns to expected levels then the outlook for the franchise in 2023 is very positive.

Overall revenue comprised grant funding of 25% (2021: 30%), cash and contra sponsorship and events of 29% (2021: 25%), Netball NZ funding of 26% (2021: 27%) and gross membership fees (including Netball NZ portion) of 18% (2021: 17%).

The major expense of the Zone is personnel costs which makes up 58% (2021: 63%) of total expenses.

STRATEGIC PLAN

During 2022 the Board updated the Strategic Plan holding consultation with Centres as part of this mahi. The plan is included later in the annual report for your information and forms the basis of our work as we head into the next couple of years.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

The first acknowledgement and thank you must go to netball centres. Your staff, volunteers, boards and committees worked really, really hard, in what was another challenging year.

We thank our Zone staff, board and volunteers who worked tirelessly throughout the year to grow and strengthen netball in the Northern Zone. We also appreciate the staff and Board of Netball NZ for their support throughout the year.



Congratulations to the following members of our Zone that received awards this year.



GRACE NWEKE – Dame Lois Muir Supreme Award (Joint winner with Kelly Jury)

The NZ Netball Awards' most prestigious title recognises the best netballer across all elite competitions and Silver Ferns campaigns.

Nweke has made a meteoric rise in all aspects of her game, the sensational shooter proving that she's a quick learner and well on the way to becoming the complete package.

A scoring machine for the MG Mystics under the hoop, Nweke's commanding form in this year's ANZ Premiership was dealt a blow at the business end when she missed several matches due to injury. But when on court, she was a pillar of strength with her 92 percent accuracy return and rebounding ability.

GRACE NWEKE - MYOB Silver Ferns Player of the Year



Awarded to a Silver Ferns player who has displayed consistent, outstanding performances throughout the international season. Decided by a panel of her peers and coaching staff, shooter Grace Nweke was awarded the MYOB Silver Ferns Player of the Year.

Rachael has been an important part of bench official development in the Zone for a number of years. She is a




COMMUNITY

The Northern Zone Community Team continued our Centre Relationship Model with mahi firmly focused on identifying priorities with our Centres and meeting regularly to review progress. Responsibility for our 16 Centres is split between Karyne and Amanda, who work collaboratively with our Zone community team, CEO Phil Vyver and RST partners to actively engage and support Centres in delivering their priorities.

We welcomed new members to the Community Team in January with Amanda Dyason appointed to the Centre Relationship Manager role, Ala Dysart beginning her NetballSmart Development Officer journey, and Briana Valgre launching into a new role as Auckland Umpire Development Officer. Change was not far away with Chonaire Huriwai moving on to a He Oranga Poutama role at Aktive and Katie Adamson heading back to Europe to play

professional volleyball. This saw Tania Heap return to the Zone as Coach Lead, quickly re-connecting with netball colleagues alongside re-acquainting with life in the big smoke. The vacant NetballSmart position was filled by Amelia Pasco, a Strength and Conditioning coach making the move from Hawkes Bay, who has quickly built relationships with our Centres and key personnel.



Centre Engagement

Centre Advisory Group

The Centre Advisory Group was established in 2022, meeting four times, with members from Netball Waitakere, Pukekohe

Netball Centre, Whangarei Netball Centre, and Netball North Harbour.

A review undertaken in September confirmed its purpose was to feedback to Northern Zone and Netball NZ about Centre challenges, connect with other Centres to take a collaborative and cohesive approach to address similar barriers, identify key projects to work together on and gather as a Zone to support each other. This aligned with the original Terms of Reference and Scope as outlined below.

PURPOSE:

• To provide strategic feedback and input to Grow and Strengthen netball in the Northern Zone.

SCOPE:

- Focus on zone initiatives and concepts for:
 - o Community/Centre Development
 - Participation
 - o Programme development e.g., Umpires, Coaching, Youth etc.

- Performance development (transition space) strategy for Centre into Zone
- Initiatives and agreement of support for Mystics and Marvels/Comets
- Sharing of best practice

The 2022 CAG identified a considerable list of topics from which the following were identified as priorities. Task forces were to be set up to address each topic before bringing back to wider group. The topics of priority were Umpires and Volunteers and Funding and Collective Purchasing. With netball pressure on the members of the CAG no further action was taken. The review identified a need for commitment and accountability to the mahi and outcomes desired by the group.

Northern Zone wishes to acknowledge our independent facilitators for their time with this project: Shirley Hooper, World Netball Board; Lynette Adams, Past CEO Sport Waitakere; and Ruth Stanley, Community Manager, Netball NZ.

Auckland Regional Centres Rep Working Group

The Zone convened and facilitated a working group from the Auckland Regional Centres to review the purpose and validity of existing representative programmes and rep circuit. A huge thank you to everyone that worked together to ensure the best outcomes for netball, and for all the administrators/draw stewards a special thank you for the extra time collaborating on tournament draws.

A decision was made that all local rep circuit tournaments would move to two x 40-minute games only. This reduces loading on players and umpires, allows coaches to test their teams in the longer game and better prepare their players for tournament. The removal of "winning" the circuit tournament drives the development philosophy for coaches ensuring better opportunities for all squad players to get game time. Centres will now look to award prizes for things like good umpiring, sportsmanship awards; thank you to travelling teams, and the best NetballSmart warmup.

The Working Group met to review the 2022 rep season and agreed the new 40-minute game format worked well for all participants – players, coaches and umpires and was agreed this will remain the format for 2023. Other recommendations in the umpiring space are that umpires hold a minimum of Centre Award for U14/16 grades, and Zone theory for U18 age groups. We appreciate the extra load on umpires, as with coaches and players, but the 2 x 40-min games are especially helpful in injury reduction, load management and time for coaching umpires.

The boys' game is growing and whilst it would be ideal to have an U17 Boys team from each Centre, if this is not possible, we encourage Centres to look to create cluster teams to increase the number of teams entered in tournaments. An increase in teams would send a strong message to Netball NZ advocating for Under17 Boys to be included in the National Under18 Championships.


Northland Centres Rep Cluster Working Group

Northland Netball Centres have been working collaboratively to form a Northland Cluster U18 team. Spearheaded by Northern Zone a working group with a representative from each of the 6 netball centres worked together to sort through policies and procedures to build a solid programme for Northland.

A massive thank you to the small, committed treasures of the Working Group who put in countless hours of volunteer time to bring this project to life. Tanya Proctor, Rebecca Simper and Lynette Gubb were the stalwarts at every meeting and netball is grateful to all you contribute. Thank you also to Rhonda Martin-Raharuhi and Natalie Moon for support with trials and logistics.

With each centre contributing to the start-up Terms of Reference were completed and mahi began. Coach, manager and trial selectors applications went out with the successful appointment of Trina Henare as Head Coach and Sophy Tua as Manager. Trials were held at Bay of Islands College in a development setting with 16 girls attending. The team were taken through the NetballSmart warmup followed by activities that promoted whanaungatanga and then into skill development and ended with fitness testing and trial games. Selections were made as a squad with travelling and non-travelling reserves, with the team attending Auckland area pre-season rep tournaments only.

First up at North Harbour they played two hard games that tested the team, however some nice play and connections were made — a great effort considering it was their first time out on court together. Their second tournament was at Papakura and we thank all the whanau that travelled to support on the sideline. Congratulations and thank you to Northland Centres for the mahi and collaboration to make this team happen and open up a pathway for their athletes. Congratulations to all those selected to represent your centres and Northland.



The cluster campaign was rounded out with the Northland Development Day in November. Trina Henare was reappointed Head Coach for 2023, with Northern Zone providing Ripeka Pirie as her Coach Mentor to build a performance-based campaign.

Northern Zone Development Day – Northland Rep Cluster

Following the establishment of the Northland Rep Cluster and running an Under 18 Squad in 2022, it was exciting to progress to this development day for any potential 2023 Under 18 or Open Grade eligible players. Northern Zone and the Mystics management delivered the day collaboratively with Northland Cluster Under 18 Coach, Trina Henare. Northern Zone have provided Trina with a Coach Mentor to support her personal coach development journey.

Thanks to Whangarei Netball Centre for hosting the day, and to key members of the Cluster Working Group – Lynette Gubb, Tanya Proctor and Rebecca Simper, for all the behind scenes mahi undertaken this year. Saturday 12th November was a full-on day for the players attending who were treated to expertise from Trina, alongside Mystics Head Coach, Tia Winikerei, Coach Mentor, Ripeka Pirie, and three Mystics players, Sulu, Phoenix and Peta, who also happen to be Silver Ferns!

Our thanks also to Sophy Tua, NetballSmart Centre Activator for providing support and education on effective warm-up and warm-down techniques. Players were put through their paces with selective skill sessions followed by game play to round out the day, all delivered to elevate these players beyond club netball in preparation for their journey to performance netball.

Northern Zone Development Day

Sunday 27th November saw 27 scouted players accept an invite to attend Northern Zone's Development Day.

These players were treated to expert coaching from a special group of coaches who were simultaneously undertaking a weekend of coach development.



Eleven coaches undertook a weekend to complete their Composite Coaching Qualification, who were extremely fortunate to be under the guidance of Netball NZ Coaching staff – Tania Karauria and Leigh Gibbs, alongside Stars Head Coach Kiri Wills, and Mystics Head Coach Tia Winikerei and Assistant Coach Rob Wright. They developed the programme of skills and activities for players, who were kept on their toes with skill sessions then game play.

Tia Winikerei commented "Both development days were a wonderful opportunity to see our young talent across the Zone shine!"



Umpires with Zone Award and higher were invited to attend alongside the athletes and coaches. They took part in a workshop on their umpiring techniques with Cory Nicholls while the NZ Umpire Coaches that also attended worked on their coaching skills and planning with Umpire Lead, Sharleen Morrell, before supporting and coaching the umpires on the games in the afternoon session.

The 2022 Zone scouting pilot identified players from Regional and National Age-Group Representative tournaments, Netball Centre competitions, and the 2022 UNISS tournament. The zone has ranked the players who have been identified using a 3-Tiered ranking system which is described below.

Tier 1	At NNL level or 1 year away from trialling – Potential for National Development Camp
Tier 2	2-3 years away from NNL level – Potential for National Development Camp
Tier 3	Future potential– keep tracking

Tier 1 players were invited to the Northern Zone Development Day. For players who have been identified in Tier 1 and 2 the zone scouting group will consider their potential for the National Development Camp in 2023 and made nominations to NNZ on behalf of these players. For players identified in all Tiers we will continue to track them throughout 2023, to observe their progress.

We are super grateful to our volunteer scouts for their commitment to netball in our Zone, who travelled to tournaments, stood on Centre courts watching countless games, then spending hours entering information and analysing data to produce these Scouting Lists. Our sincere thanks go out to Liz Page, Amanda Dyason, Rachel Rasmussen and Kathy Henry, 2022 Volunteer Scouting Group.

Near the end of the year World Netball announced the officials selected for the FAST5 Netball World Series, Christchurch 2022, that took place from the 5th – 6th November.

Umpire Coach Developers

Umpire Coach Developers (UCD) are an integral part of the umpire structure. To have the greatest impact on developing community and performance umpires they focus on helping develop our umpire coaches to be effective in the coaching of umpires.

We have 14 UCDs in Northern Zone, including three new UCDs in 2022. They provided many development opportunities for our umpire coaches throughout the season.

Workshops & Observations

24 Workshops run by 18 different UCDers and facilitators compared to 14 run by 7 in 2021. A huge step up most notably in the number of different UCDers used.

27 observation opportunities provided by 8 UCDers compared to 16 by 6 in 2021. Again, another big step up aligned to the priorities in the Technical Officials Ops plan.

Bench Officials



Our bench officials not only work hard throughout the year at the Synergy Hair Netball League, ANZ Premiership, local tournaments and in their local netball centres, they are also selected to go to national tournaments.

Congratulations to Bobby-Jo Buchanan (unable to attend), Carollynn Frew, Darren Beattie and Denise Neal who were selected to the NZ Open Champs and Maree Wallace who will travel to NZ Secondary School Champs.

NetballSmart

The Healthy Heart of Netball was back in 2022 for its fifth year. Despite initially starting the year in "Red COVID Level" we were able to host plenty of workshops within Centres. Once we moved to "Orange" we were able to hit the ground running in schools around the Zone. Our two Northern Zone Development Officers have supported Centres, schools, clubs and communities with a variety of workshops and preparation programmes. We have also been involved in several development days, "Have A Go Days", Hauora days and many other events both at a Zone and Centre Level. These educational programmes included but were not limited to:

- 4 UmpireSmart Workshops
- 40 AIMS work shops
- Preparation (Pre-Season) Programmes across 3 Centres
- 10 Centre Event Collaborations including Have A Go Days, Hauora Days, Development Days and Mass Warm-Ups
- 19 SmartPlayer Workshops

Our NSDO's had a great year and really enjoyed being able to string together a full year and embed NetballSmart into all levels without too many COVID interruptions. We were able to deliver workshops from Kerikeri all the way to Pukekohe.

Third time seemed to be a charm in 2022 with both the AIMS and UNISS tournaments being able to be held. It was amazing to see these two tournaments get off the ground after a 2 year hiatus. We were able to run 40 tournament preparation workshops with AIMs coaches and we were quite impressed with the level of the NetballSmart Warm-Ups at AIMS. At UNISS we were part of research study group which looked at the quality and content of teams' warm-ups — we were impressed with elements of them but some were missing key elements such as stopping, jumping and landing — this is the game of Netball. Don't be afraid to reach out to your NSDO on how you can make YOUR warm-up more NetballSmart. We can't wait to be involved in these tournaments again in 2023.

As the healthy heart of Netball, NetballSmart are very pleased with how well we have managed to reduce injuries in our secondary school space and bring awareness to the community in every aspect.



We want to give a huge thanks to you, our community, players, coaches, managers, teams and Centres for trusting and believing in what we do and getting behind the programme. Coach Development Hui

Coach Development in our zone is in a good space. In 2022 the Netball Northern Zone can boast that we have very experienced coach developers with several of them stepping into the coach training space.

We had two Coach Developer Hui (Trainings) to support and train our coach developers, one in Te Tai Tokerau facilitated by our very own Netball Northern Zone super star duo, Rhonda and Sharleen. They ran a fun and valuable day of learning for new Coach Developers.

A Coach Developer is someone who coaches the player coaches, or umpire coaches, so a coach for the coaches! Coach Developers, when fully trained, can deliver workshops from the NNZ Coach Framework and Umpire Modules, but this is only part of their role. Coach Developers can provide on the spot live coaching support at your Centre. This is one of the reasons we aim to have Coach Developers localised at every Centre. They get to know your people, can help give direct support and connect your coaches/umpires within your community. A huge thank you to the eager learners that attended, and we look forward to supporting you as you embark on your Coach Developer journey. Particularly fun was the paper plane exercise – certainly brought out the competitive spirit.







The other Coach Developer Hui (training) took place in Tamaki Makaurau and was organised and facilitated by our awesome trainers throughout our zone, along with the support of the Netball Northern Zone Team. Our trainer sessions included:

Rachel Brown-Cole from Waiuku Netball Centre got us started with a challenging ice breaker on the 'Art of Questioning.' We had the lovely Trina Henare from Te Tai Tokerau who educated us on Māori Tikanga. Karen Aulelio from Auckland Netball Centre got us all to think about our goals, fears of delivering and the advantages of self-reflection. Pete McInnes from Waitakere Netball Centre and Michelle Wallace from North Harbour Netball Centre facilitated 'What is a Coach Developer?' and provided us with ideas and resources that we can use when facilitating modules. And the wonderful Leah Lazarus extended us and got us to understand the advantages of the art of questioning and the how to. We also had Leigh Gibbs from NNZ come along to explain the roles we find ourselves in and Game Sense Philosophy.







The highlight and certainly a very useful session was presented by our very own Netball Northern Board Member Michele Teague, who shared her expertise and knowledge on marketing and how we (Coach Developers) can transfer these skills to getting more coaches involved in workshops and seeing real value in them.

We had over 30 plus current and newbie coach and umpire developers along with trainers and Netball Northern Zone Staff attend the day. And we are very grateful to everyone who got involved and took time out of their busy lives to make this day successful.

This puts us in good stead for 2023 where we will ensure we provide ongoing support, guidance, and education opportunities to all our coach developers and trainers to ensure they're confident to support coaches at their local Centre.

Coaching Modules

We had over 1200 coaches attend future FERNS foundation coaching workshops. future FERNS is a brilliant program for our young players, as they learn our wonderful game as they develop.

We also had several Centre's deliver the Year 7 & 8 Player Development Programme (PDP) which focuses on the 'Balance is Better' Philosophy, culminating in attendance at Festival Days around the Zone.

- To gain an understanding of skill acquisition, skill development and decision making in a competitive environment
- Understand the value of game analysis and how to use it to enhance the performance of players and the team.
- Plant seeds for continued growth and development and support systems required for coaches.

The 2022 season will go down as one of the most challenging in Mystics history. The season started and finished with significant Covid-19 impacts resulting in 3 games needing to be rescheduled, pre-season games and tournaments being cancelled and needing to use an addition 10 players throughout the season just to be able to field a team for every game.

Living with COVID-19 day to day in a performance environment was a constant balancing act of protecting our people while still preparing them to perform. We once again proved we were well practiced at adapting at short notice. Connection and resilience were heavily relied upon as we forged ahead into the 2022 season and leveraging off the standards and values set out in 2021 with the bulk of the team remaining the same. New shooting blood in the form of Monica Falkner brought a dynamic fast paced competitor to the team.

Pre-season games were few and far between but in early February we managed to play games against WBOP Magic and Mainland Tactix. These proved to be invaluable as the only games we played against other ANZ Premierships teams prior to the first round. The opportunity this did afford our team was the necessity for us to force training standards to the highest levels. Standards and targets were set higher to push us to be the best team we could be leading into competition.

Even with the COVID-19 disruptions, playing in empty stadiums or with small masked crowds, rescheduled games and replacement players the team proved competitive throughout the first two rounds of games, with Mystics sitting top of the table after 11 games and securing the Barfoot and Thompson Northern Challenge Trophy for another year. However, things took a turn during the final round. A combination of injuries and COVID-19 impacts on players resulted in losses for our final 4 games of the season. Still placed third we had the chance to play off for a Finals spot against the Northern Stars at Pulman Arena on Wednesday 8th June. Unfortunately, the injury and illness toll was too much to bear with Stars securing a 63-57 victory.

At the end of a rollercoaster season we sadly said goodbye to Helene Wilson after 6 years as Head Coach. The Northern Mystics and Northern Zone are so grateful for all the hours of service Helene has given to growing athletes and staff within the zone and we wish her all the best in her new venture at High Performance Sport NZ.

PERFORMANCE

In December 2021 we offered a pre-Christmas skill development programme to the next tier of young athletes who aspire to play high performance netball. This served as an introduction to the MG Northern Mystics collective skill set, and preparation for Northern Marvels trials in January 2022. Following these trials, 11 positions were taken up to join the 2022 Northern Zone Performance Programme (NZPP). Within this group, three were named in the NZ Under 21 squad, two in the NZ Secondary School squad, and two as MG Northern Mystics two as apprentice training partners.

Over the past 5 years we have built this longitudinal programme to include strength and conditioning, athlete support - including individual planning, and weekly netball skills session, which are focused on individual development and coached by the MG Northern Mystics coaches.

In 2022 NZPP successfully transitioned Danielle Binks and Carys Stythe into the MG Mystics as training partners. Carys Stythe was then fully contracted into the 2023 MG Mystics team. These two players were also selected for the NZ Under 21s and the NNZ Young Internationals squad.

FACILITIES

Auckland Regional Facilities Working Group

The Regional Facilities Working Group continued to provide targeted support to Centre projects, alongside advocating to key stakeholders, Aktive and Auckland City Council on the needs and future thinking for netball facilities in our Zone.

The Auckland Council Facilities Investment Fund saw three netball projects approved. Centres, Northern Zone, and the Regional Facilities Working Group took considerable time and effort to submit detailed, worthy applications that have the best chance of success. The two-stage application process is intense, complex and time consuming — so a huge amount of gratitude and respect to the Centres involved. We are forever grateful to the services of members of the Regional Facilities Working Group whose expertise has been invaluable in actively supporting these applications.

From the 103 initial expressions of interest, only 36 were approved for stage two from which 34 applicants were granted funding. Netball Projects successful are:

Mangere-Otahuhu Netball Centre \$545,000 for court rubberisation
Rodney Netball Centre \$100,000 for court redevelopment
Waiuku Netball Centre \$230,000 for facilities upgrade

For Rodney Netball Centre the court redevelopment has been many years of council lobbying, and with only three of six courts left playable extremely relieving to know new courts are on the horizon.

Mangere-Otahuhu will relish a new rubberised surface, and Waiuku continue to upgrade their courts and facilities implementing their long-term asset management and improvement plan.

The Regional Facilities Working Group along with Zone Community Netball Manager, Karyne Ross, continue to provide support to these Centres through the implementation phase to bring their projects to life.

In Northland support has been provided to Mangonui Netball Centre in liaising with Te Hiku Sports Hub providing a future focus and long-term plan for this Centre. Mangonui committee have been fearless and committed in advocating to Far North District Council, with success finally seeing a much-needed upgrade to the courts including fencing and lights being undertaken at the end of 2022. This is a huge relief for this Centre as courts became near unplayable this season. Thank you to Far North District Council for your continued support of netball.

With newly elected Local Boards holding the key to funding for facilities and sport initiatives at a community level, it is imperative Centres connect strongly with new

councillors. Post-election boards will be completing their new three-year budgets and plans with the opportunity for submissions and consultation which Centres, and their members, need to be actively engaged with.

It is strongly recommended that Centres present to their Local Board at least annually, ensuring the value of sport to their communities remains top of mind for councillors. Building relationships with boards and councillors can be enhanced by inviting them to Board or Executive meetings, prizegivings and events of importance at your Centre. If you are unsure or have never done this, please contact your Centre Relationship Manager for advice. The Zone can also support you with, and at the presentation.

The Regional Facilities Working Group are investigating a refresh of the 2015 Auckland Regional Netball Facilities Strategy in 2023, subject to securing funding to resource this project. This refresh will include input from centres and key netball stakeholders to provide guidance across the facilities environment for the future.




Participation – Festival Days

In this little chicks team we have one student/player for which this format of netball is making a huge difference. Her name is Bella and she has Cerebral Palsy. Being able to participate in a sport alongside her peers means so much to her, her friends, our school and her whānau.

Monday 16th was her first night and she had an absolute blast. She was able to participate fully in the warm up, skills session and join in the game. Just the fact that it is a rubber ball with grips makes it easier for her to catch but then the 'adjustable' hoop which means every player in the team and their ability can be celebrated. The inclusiveness of this format is something we think should be valued and we have noticed how much of a difference it is making to our tamariki.

This is all because of the format of the game for this age group and we hope that it creates some wonderful memories and an attitude that 'anything' is possible, especially for Bella."



MANGONUI NETBALL CENTRE - PLAYER DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME

Estelle Thompson at the Mangonui Netball Centre is the PDP (Player Development Programme) Facilitator and in her 4th season in her role. They have had steady numbers over the past years with around 36 players both male and female participants. They will send 3 teams to Festival days around the motu this year with help of the Far North Rural Travel fund they acquired for the first time this year.

They have 3 dedicated coaches, who are as passionate about the development of our players as Estelle is. As well as coaches and players, we are using the opportunity to develop their umpires under our Centres Coordinator Renee Walters. Together they are using this as an opportunity to develop as a Centre. They see these players are the future of their centre and we plan to bring through a really high quality of players, coaches and umpires.

Estelle arranged to have Guest speakers lined up to spend time with the PDP group every weekend. In conjunction with Netball Northern they arranged Mystics players Sulu Fitzpatrick and Grace Nweke to zoom in. They answered many questions the girls had and spoke about "Early Specialisation & the Pressures of Performing at a High Performance levels". Ala from NetballSmart who spoke about Netball Tournament Preparation, Joanne Urlich from Te Hauora o Te Hiku o Te Ika on focused on nutrition and Far North Physio, the importance of avoiding injury and recovery.



The goal for the season is to extend knowledge as well as building a Netball Community focused on development. Estelle hopes that the programme will grow throughout older age groups and retain players as they get older and provide the pathway for them in the Far North. GOVERNANCE

Corporate Governance

The Board is responsible for governing Netball Northern Zone Incorporated and carrying out the objectives, responsibilities and obligations as described in our Constitution. The Board is responsible for determining strategies, policies and financial arrangements for the Northern Zone.

The Board will govern Netball Northern Zone with emphasis on:

- serving the legitimate collective interests of the members and other stakeholders of Netball Northern Zone Inc. and accounting to them fully for the performance of Netball Northern Zone and for the Board's stewardship;
- remaining up to date in terms of key stakeholders' concerns, needs and aspirations;
- developing a future focus;
- providing leadership in the exploration of strategic issues rather than administrative detail;
- behaving proactively rather than reacting to events and others' initiatives;
- bringing a diversity of opinions and views to bear on its decisions;
- expressing collective responsibility for all aspects of the business of netball in the Northern Zone; and
- ensuring there are positive conditions for the motivation and conduct of the Chief Executive.

Committees

The Board has three standing Committees described below. Each Committee has a terms of reference describing how it is to operate and its responsibilities.

Finance and Risk Committee

The Committee comprises four Directors, one of whom is appointed Chair. The Chair of this Committee may not be the Board Chair. The Chief Executive attends meetings and the external auditors may attend by invitation of the Chair. The Committee currently comprises Michele Teague (Chair), Rawinia Newton, Maria Sopoaga and Mary Gardiner. The Committee met 6 times during the year.

The purpose of this Committee is to assist the Board with its responsibilities with respect to overseeing all aspects of financial reporting, control and audit functions and organisational risk.

Funding Committee

The Committee comprises at least two Directors, one of whom is appointed Chair and up to three independent advisors. The Chief Executive and Operations Manager along with a representative of Netball NZ attend meetings. The Committee currently comprises Sue Brewster (Chair), Rawinia Newton, Michele Teague and Kurt Tyson. The Committee met 6 times during the year.

The purpose of this Committee is to support development of the funding strategy, monitor and review its implementation and to support the Board to give sufficient focus to the funding strategy.

Appointments Committee

The Committee comprises two Directors, one of whom is appointed Chair. The Committee currently comprises Mary Gardiner (Chair) and Sue Brewster (Deputy Chair). The Committee met once during the year.

The purpose of this Committee is to assist the Board in planning the board's composition, assess the competencies required, identify prospective board members and develop succession plans for the board.

1 Accounting Policies

Reporting Entity

Netball Northern Zone Incorporated (NNZI) is an Incorporated Society in New Zealand, incorporated in November 2012. NNZI is a Public Benefit Entity. The special purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with s23(i) of the Incorporated Societies Act 1908.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted in the preparation and presentation of the special purpose financial statements. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated:

Basis of Reporting

The special purpose financial statements have been prepared applying the accounting principles of accrual accounting.

The special purpose financial statements have been prepared on the basis of historical cost.

The special purpose financial statements comprise of Special Purpose Statements of Financial Position, Financial Performance, Movements in Equity and Accounting Policies as well as the Notes to these statements. The special purpose financial statements are presented in New Zealand Dollars (NZ\$).

The special purpose financial statements have been prepared on a going-concern basis, which contemplates continuity of normal business activities and the realisation of assets and the settlement of liabilities in the ordinary course of business. The Board consider it appropriate for these special purpose financial statements to be prepared on a going concern basis.

Goods & Services Tax

Figures shown in these special purpose financial statements are exclusive of GST, with the exception of accounts receivable and accounts payable.

Revenue Recognition

The revenue from Sponsorship contracts is allocated over the term of the contract. Where the Sponsorship relates to a specific event the revenue is recognised when the event occurs

The revenue from Grants that are project specific is recognised when the project occurs.

Contra received is to recognise in-kind contributions. They are recognised as sponsorship revenue when amounts are quantifiable in terms of the sponsorship contract.

Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are recognised at net realisable value.

Plant, Equipment and Depreciation

Plant & Equipment is stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Plant & Equipment have been written off over their estimated useful lives on a straight line basis to calculate the depreciation charge for the year as follows:

> IT Equipment 2-5 years Furniture & Fittings 2-15 years

Uniforms

Uniforms are expensed at the time of purchase.

NNZI is a Non-profit body for taxation purposes under section CW 46 of the Income Tax Act 2007 and as such no taxation is payable on the surplus for the year.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand and at banks.

Changes in Accounting Policies

There has been no change in accounting policies during the year and they have been applied on a consistent basis.
