GRAND FINAL WRAP

The MG Mystics have claimed ANZ Premiership grand final glory in the perfect send off for retiring captain Sulu Fitzpatrick, dominating Tāmaki Makaurau rivals the Robinhood Stars 74 to 56 at a sold-out GLOBOX Arena in Hamilton.

Speaking at the final whistle, head coach Tia Winikerei said it was her team's most complete performance of the season and the timing could not be better.

The Mystics led at the close of each quarter, despite a strong fight back from the Stars in the second chapter.

Goal-shooter Grace Nweke was named Most Valuable Player with a near perfect performance, shooting 70 out of 73 attempts with an outstanding percentage of 96%.

It is the Mystics' second ANZ Premiership title adding to their 2021 win which featured seven of the current squad – Grace Nweke, Peta Toeava, Tayla Earle, Sulu Fitzpatrick, Filda Vui, Phoenix Karaka and Claire O'Brien.

Name: Roxanne Adams Netball Centre: Auckland Netball Centre Umpire Coach Qualification: Centre Coach Assessor

About you:

I love netball and have played since the 1970's. Injuries have happened for me, and I was unable to play, so ventured on the pathway of umpiring in 2012. I have had brilliant mentors supporting my umpiring journey and showing me the ropes. This had opened my eyes to more opportunities for rangatahi in my community to take this pathway too. I have coached many rangatahi and adults over the last 5 years and continue to bring more umpires to support this wonderful sport. I am a social worker, and I am always on the lookout for keen rangatahi who want to do umpiring.

When did you start coaching umpires and why did you decide to become an umpire coach?

2018 I started coaching. As a social worker in my community, I thought I would be able to do more for the rangatahi that I work with and help them gain skills, confidence and financial gain. Umpiring has definitely been a vehicle to better outcomes for youth in my community.

Why do you enjoy coaching?

The struggles for the young, new umpires are real and they sometimes don't want to do umpiring anymore. If I can support and encourage them to be brave to blow the whistle, don't give up and lend some support to them in some way, that has made my time worthwhile. Umpiring starts at this junior level and unless we put some effort in to support them, we will start losing umpires and missing the upcoming talented ones too.

What skill areas have you enjoyed developing as a coach?

To be patient, listen carefully, umpired centred not coach centred, care for others and be understanding about where they are at as an umpire. I am continuing to develop more skills for myself as a coach.

What has been your best experience?

That the umpires are at the games, and they are enjoying themselves. That they ask questions and willing to learn more about what umpiring involves. That they have had a good game.

What would be your best advice for new umpire coaches and for umpires just starting to work with a coach?

Keep coming back every year. Be confident and ready to do their best. Reach out for support from the coaches at ANC and keep reading the rules and asking questions if you don't understand. I will continue to support umpires wherever it is needed.

Following our AGM presentation by Anita Coy-Macken from Visitor Solutions Ltd, Northern Zone are pleased to advise a review of the Auckland Regional Facilities Plan will be undertaken this year. The first step will be gathering updated information from our 11 Auckland regional centres. To that end a questionnaire will be sent to all Centres for your completion. It is envisaged engagement with your facilities staff, centre or general managers, executive committees and Board members will be required to fully complete the questionnaire. Our deadline for information gathering is 31 July.

Following Centre and other Stakeholder (Auckland Council, Aktive and RST's) data collection there will be further meetings held with some individual Centres in early August. Once analysis has been completed a workshop open to all Centres will be run in September to present findings.

Netball NZ Court Guidelines Update

Netball NZ are currently updating their Court Guidelines, and will be sending Centres nationwide an online survey to complete in the very near future. We appreciate that there may be some cross-over or duplication between Northern Zone Questionnaire and NNZ Survey however this is unavoidable and we are working to our best ability to ensure it has limited impact for Centres. The national court guidelines will provide clarity from netball's national body of court surface and covering requirements for the different levels of play.

Coach

The challenge of getting coaches to attend workshops is very REALI!

Einstein's famous quote: 'Insanity is doing the same thing over and over again and expecting different results.'

Following is how three of our centers have tried different ways of getting those busy coaches to attend modules .

Being super busy is a fact; what with work commitments, looking after our whanau, weather events, voluntary work, other learning commitments, making time for friends and let's not forget the most important thing; self-care'; it is not surprising that going to a coaching module/workshop, in the wintertime, battling traffic, leaving your family at home; is low on our priority list.

Howick Pakuranga Netball Centre has had up to 20 coaches register to attend their workshops. On Wednesday and Saturday competitions, Shante the HPNC Coach Developer personally invites coaches to attend the workshops. People love that face-to-face contact – a connection that builds trust and transparency, allowing opportunity for discussion on the workshop that is taking place. Shante has created a Howick Pakuranga Netball 'Community of Support' Facebook Page that while has only been up for a few months already has nearly 100 members. This page is also an opportunity to let coaches know when workshops are taking place. She has revamped the website to make it easier to follow. Shante observed when most coaches were training and in doing so, set the workshops to take place directly after their training, thus coaches only coming out once a week.

Pukekohe Netball Centre has been getting a few coaches to workshops. Kat West had a brainwave and invited Ivana Rowland, Waikato BOP Magic Team player, to be a guest speaker at a Shooting Module that she was delivering. It was no surprise that Ivana was an awesome draw card, with almost 20 coaches attending the workshop. Ivana shared her journey and experiences as a professional athlete in our game. This was a valuable experience for all those attended, acknowledged by the following feedback:

'It was inspirational listening to Ivana and her journey', 'Great ideas shared amongst the coaches', 'Loved the activities and will be implementing them at my trainings.'





Auckland Netball Centre just recently hosted guest speaker Sue Hawkins who has had many coaching accolades including past International English Roses Coach and Tactix Coach. An international coach is always going to be an epic draw card and Sue was no exception. She offered some helpful ideas on Attack and Defence, that would support all coaches in their training session.

There is no denying getting coaches to workshops is a challenge; but it is our gift to hook those coaches, provide them with a good experience and they will never want to leave!

Congratulations and Celebrations to those Coaches who have completed the Netball New Zealand Community Coach Award

Congratulations and celebrations to Kat West and Luke Gillies of Pukekohe Netball Centre for completing their Netball New Zealand Community Coach Award level 1 (CCA1). This is by no means an easy accomplishment, it is quite an extraordinary triumph, and it can take a few years to complete!

CCA Level 1 award requires the coach to complete the Sport Tutor online modules as well as the practical components at a workshop. The modules include Attack, Defence, Building Effective Relationships, Selecting, Skills Analysis, Shooting, Team Culture, Planning, Learning to Umpire and Netball Smart Module.

When I asked Kat what she loved about coaching, she shared... 'I love coaching because I believe I am helping to create a community of Netball Players that will love the game for life. If I can teach someone something that can help them be the netball player that they want to be then I will keep coaching'.

To achieve the Netball New Zealand Community Coach Award Level 2 you are also required to complete online and practical components. They include, Developing Physical Literacy, Introduction to Mental Skills, Through-court, Tournament Planning, Centre Pass on Attack and Defence, Circle Work, Introduction to Game Analysis, and a practical coach observation.

Luke Gillies shares his views:

'The module content is great, you little bit by little bit build a very sound base of netball knowledge and a greater appreciation for how to deliver a coaching session with a higher engagement from the players. I'm a firm believer in "you don't know what you don't know" so I am always looking for ways to add to my coaching toolkit and in every session I had 1 or 2 absolute lightbulb moments where I was like "oh I see, that's why that happens or "that's how to overcome this issue". I guess the alternative could be a lifetime of coaching or you accelerate your learning by attending these courses.

'Prior to starting CCA1 & CCA2 my coaching nature would have been to "tell" the players how to do something but now I definitely see great benefit in drawing the answers or solutions out of the players themselves, I don't think my coaching would have evolved this way had I not started these courses so I am grateful that the assistance is available.

I think in netball we are so lucky to have this system to learn in, I was recently at a meeting of coaches from many different sports and they were blown away when I told them what was available to us, also the support I have received from The Pukekohe Netball Centre, Kat West (our coach developer) and Netball Northern has been beyond what I thought would be accessible, I would encourage anyone involved in Netball coaching to make use of this resource.'



As Kat and Luke have demonstrated, the coaches that attend and complete these modules show an exceptional, caring, dedication and motivation to be the best coaches they can be for their players. It is a real credit to them, and we are very fortunate to have them servicing our sport.

If we can keep our young people playing sport by creating a great experience, where they can learn and develop in a safe encouraging environment where their needs are first and foremost, then we know we are making a positive difference to their lives and in doing so contributing to healthy communities.

We have a fantastic team of volunteers and that is a huge credit to Kim.



Carla Gordon:

Kia ora tatou

My name is Carla Gordon and I hail from the far north of the North Island but have been a "westie" for over 20 years. When my daughters started playing at Netball Waitakere, I decided that instead of being a side-line critic, I might as well put my hand up to coach. That was around 18 years ago, and I have been involved with the clubs and representative programmes at Netball Waitakere ever since.

I have coached across the age groups in the representative space and also at high school UNISS level for a number of years. Last year I was voted in as the representative convenor for Netball Waitakere. This year I also have the honour of being a coach developer within our netball community and now a zone scout for 2023.

Every person that kits up to take the court brings an element of excitement and talent to the game that we are dedicated to, so I look forward to seeing what the nation's best at the u18 level will be putting out come July.

Liz Page:

Liz has been involved in coaching Netball for over 20 years. Over this time she has coached and selected at Premier Secondary School, Premier Club and Representative Level in the Auckland, Waitakere and Wellington Netball Centres. Liz has been part of the National Development Camp Selections for the Northern Zone, along with being a selector at the Upper North Island Secondary School tournament and has previously been the Head Selector for the North Island Under 15 Representative tournament.

Pete McInnes:

I began coaching in 2001 when a friend of mine said she wanted an assistant coach, and I thought it might be fun. I completed my Community Coach Award (CCA) in 2013 and the Performance Coach Qualification in 2016.

My coaching began at the Technical Netball Club in Christchurch and coached there before coaching Lincoln University in 2016 and 2017. I then went onto coach and Men's and Mixed teams in Canterbury.

I was invited to do the Sport NZ Performance Coach Advance program in 2016 and 2017 and then undertook Sport NZ coach developer training in 2017.

I coached the Mainland Beko team (National Netball League) in 2017 where we finished 2nd before moving to Auckland in 2018 for work and family.

Since moving back to Auckland in 2018 I have coached the Waitakere U19 team in 2018 and 2019, I spent 2 years with the Northern Stars as a resource and apprentice coach in 2020 and 2021. I currently coach AUT in the North Harbour premier competition and I am the Athlete Development and Pathways Lead for Netball Northern where I lead the talent ID and development programmes.
