The ANZ Premiership is drawing to a close with a must win Elimination Final between the Robinhood Stars and MG Mystics all set for Wednesday evening at Pulman Arena. Get your tickets – don't delay as they will be snapped up in no time! A great season by both teams regardless of the result, given the difficulties faced this year.

The winner will progress to face the Te Wānanga o Raukawa Pulse in the Grand Final on Sunday 12 June in Wellington.

Whilst that level of netball is nearing its conclusion, the representative season at U14, U16 and U18 level is getting underway. Pukekohe held the first tournament of the circuit with the new two round 40-minute game format in play for the first time. This was a result of Zone facilitated consultation and discussion between Centres, seeking to improve representative programmes including the format of circuit tournaments. It is great to see this level of collaboration in the Northern Zone.

### **ZONE NEWS FROM OUR BOARD**

### Scenario planning

While it's great to be back on court playing netball there is still a lot of uncertainty and disruption. A recent example for the Northern Zone was the postponement of the MG Mystics ANZ Premiership game against the Pulse. We had a workshop with centre board members and a sponsor event being hosted by 2Degrees set to occur prior to the game. Hence the game postponement caused disruption to players, sponsors, fans, the venue, broadcaster and incurred time and cost to reschedule.

Ongoing uncertainty and disruption have caused the Zone to refresh our scenario planning so that we are ready to act quickly i.e. conserve cash and look after staff, when the unexpected occurs. We encourage you to do the same and be prepared.

The form of the scenario planning can be up to your centre board or committee, based on how you operate and how much buffer you have on your balance sheet. It could be a conversation in a committee meeting or a simple one pager e.g., if revenue is 10% or 25% lower than planned, we reduce or defer xx and yy. Alternatively, you may prepare another version of your budget with different revenue and cost assumptions.

Reference to your strategy and asset and maintenance plan may also guide options and priorities. It's not important to predict the type and size of disruption, but rather to have options and plans ready, to respond when the unexpected does occur.

### Attend centre board and committee meetings – please invite us

As promoted in previous newsletters we (members of the Zone Board) would like to participate in a board or committee meeting at every centre this year. This is part of our effort to enhance communication and collaboration, specifically with a governance focus, so complementary to the community advisory group and Centre Connect workshops and other regular collaboration.

We love a good news story, and this gives us all the feels - thanks Jess from Waiotira School for sending this through to us, and to Bella's whanau for letting us share. "Waiotira is a small rural school with a roll of 28 students, but we manage to organise 2 Junior netball teams. One of these teams is a Yr 1/2 team that has 7 players and plays on Monday

In this little chicks team we have one student/player for which this format of netball is making a huge difference. Her name is Bella and she has Cerebral Palsy. Being able to participate in a sport alongside her peers means so much to her, her friends, our school and her whānau.

Monday 16th was her first night and she had an absolute blast. She was able to participate fully in the warm up, skills session and join in the game. Just the fact that it is a rubber ball with grips makes it easier for her to catch but then the 'adjustable' hoop which means every player in the team and their ability can be celebrated. The inclusiveness of this format is something we think should be valued and we have noticed how much of a difference it is making to our tamariki.

This is all because of the format of the game for this age group and we hope that it creates some wonderful memories and an attitude that 'anything' is possible, especially for Bella."



### ZONE SCOUTING GROUP

Netball Northern Zone is calling for *Expressions of Interest* for representatives who would like to be part of forming a Zone Scouting Group.

The overarching objective of this group would be to identify players with the potential to play performance and high-performance netball in the future.

Scouts would part of a group who attend tournaments and competitions within the Northern Zone region. This could be:

- At your local netball centre; in the school or club competition.
- At representative tournaments held in the Northern Zone.
- At and school tournaments held in the Northern Zone.

Further opportunities may to scout may include:

- The National U18 tournament
- The National Open Age tournament
- Regional Secondary Schools Championship (UNISS)
- National Netball League (NNL) matches

Scouts will be provided with professional development about the Northern Zone scouting philosophy and process and given the opportunity to contribute to the succession planning for the Northern Zone region.

The scouting group would share the load and the initial step can be as simple as collecting information about players from your local netball centre.

We are looking for people who are interested in talent identification, and have <u>any</u> of the following attributes:

- Want to learn more about scouting.
- Coached or are currently coaching.
- Played at an elite level and may be coaching.
- Understand athlete development is progressive and takes time.
- Willing to look outside of here and now. E.g., can look at a player and see their potential to be great in the future (with time and training)
- Willing to work collaboratively with zone and other netball centres to build a database of understanding about Northern Zone players.
- Is open minded, will listen to diverse thinking, and share their honest opinion.
