TRANSITION SPACE – Scouting, Coach Squad, Strategy

The transition space, as we call it, is the stepping stone from community netball to performance netball. It bridges the gap for those athletes (players and umpires) and coaches who aspire to higher honours such as National Netball League or ANZ Premiership.

It is acknowledged that some of the Zone work done in the Transition Space provides learning opportunities for community coaches wishing to be the best they can at Centre Representative level in Under 18 and Open Age groups.

Scouting

In 2023 5 trained Zone scouts attended 4 of 5 local Auckland regional circuit tournaments, UNISS, and U18 national tournaments. The MG Mystics coaching staff and Athlete Development Lead attended NNZ Open Age Group tournament. The Scouts prepare an athlete list, which is then ranked, and from which players are invited to Northern Zone Development Days. The athlete list also provides a base from which the Scouting Group make nominations to Netball NZ for attendance at National Development Camp. This year saw 66 players attend the invite only Development Day, and 25 athletes invited by Netball NZ to National Development Camp.

To serve our scouting group better, Centres are asked to provide feedforward information on players. This enables the Scouting Group to target whom they view at the various tournaments, and ensures as many players as possible are seen by the group.



Coach Squad

A new initiative in 2023, the Coach Squad comprises of 19 coaches who aspire to higher levels, and are open to continuous learning. This new initiative is a work in progress, and we are learning as we go, currently addressing the learning requests of the group. We will report throughout the coming year as this group undertake various activities, and the evaluation of the programme.

Transition Strategy

Northern Zone will create a Transition Strategy with the objective to transition community people to performance level. A framework will be established to ensure alignment with the Netball NZ High Performance Strategy and Northern Zone Strategy, following which consultation will be undertaken with Centres to start the build of the strategy.

It is hoped consultation will be undertaken in February 2024 with a view to building the strategy during the coming year.

In the meantime, Northern Zone will continue with our Scouting Programme, Coach Squad and Umpire Performance Strategy implementation.

PARTICIPATION

Woolworths futureFERNS Survey

The annual Woolworths futureFERNS survey is still open. The survey will close on 15th Dec 2023 to allow as many people to complete this as possible, so please make sure that your netball community know about this and take the opportunity to give feedback.

Woolworths futureFERNS branded gear/equipment

At this stage WW is **not** able to confirm gear or funding for gear for Centres but it is hoped this will be able to go ahead by mid next year (2024). At this stage it not clear exactly what this will look like but it could possibly include branded balls and bibs. Please note, this is not confirmed and only what NNZ are thinking is the intention at this stage.

NNZ also wish to clarify that Centres are able to use any of old branded equipment to get seasons underway until it is known what WW will fund. Re-branded Woolworths futureFERNS gear will be in stock on the website around May 2024. It is hoped this this could be earlier and as soon as confirmation is received Centres will be advised.

Expressions of Interest for Funding - Targeted Participation Projects at Centres

Increasing Participation is a key strategy for both Netball NZ and Northern Zone, both of whom have some allocated funding available to support up to 4 Targeted Participation Projects at Centres next year.

Project objectives should focus on

- Women and Girls
- Providing quality netball experiences
- Fostering and growing participation
- New initiatives or opportunities for communities that currently have limited access to netball, that mitigate any type of barrier preventing their participation

Some examples are Pilot programmes for walking netball, FAST5, futureFERNS for adults, Beach netball, establishing satellite programme or venue, trialling a new game-day process, reviewing competition days or season length, keeping participants involved during a key drop-out window (e.g. new to Secondary School or post-Secondary School), removing barriers or intimidating factors for older 'new' participants.

UMPIRES

New Rules Rollout

World Netball will soon be releasing the changes to the rules of Netball and a new Rule Book, and we know everyone is anxiously waiting to see what changes have been made.

Netball NZ are leading the Community rollout of the new rules, with an action plan to ensure local delivery of the changes. Northern Zone has 15 Umpire facilitators from across our region that will undertake training with Netball NZ, enabling them to then present the rule changes to our local communities across umpiring, playing and coaching. This will ensure that all participants in netball can understand the new rule changes.

What: Changes to the Rules of Netball

When: Effective 1 January 2024

<u>Why</u>: From time to time the World Netball Rules Advisory Panel (RAP) review the rules of Netball to maintain the spectacle of the game and to help the game evolve. World Netball have been through a lengthy consultation process with key stakeholders of the game and made changes to the Rules of Netball.

<u>What next</u>: NNZ will create content from the World Netball information and work with Umpire Leads and trained facilitators to manage the rollout.

Umpire Advisory Group

At our Centre Forum in October we discussed "Umpiring – the question of payment?"

Key points from that discussion were:

- Consistency of payment all pay or all not pay and for which competitions/events
- Payment guidelines or recommendations link to qualifications
- Investigate other models ie/ basketball or other Zone models
- Promote the "feeling" of umpires as athletes this is my sport

It was agreed the creation of an Advisory Group would prove fruitful to further the conversation ensuring a collaborative and collective approach by Northern Zone Centres. Northern Zone will provide administration resource with expectations representatives of Centres from umpire committee or convenor, school sport coordinators and clubs would form initial group.

Thank you to the 3 Centres – Netball North Harbour, Waiuku Netball Centre and Auckland Netball Centre, that have agreed to be part of the Umpire Advisory Group. We will convene in late February to create an action plan. In the meantime, if any other Centres wish to be part of this group please complete the action below.

Special thanks to Coach Developer Pete McInnes and his Coach Developer Champions Carla Gordon and Natalie Pati who delivered 9 of the NNZ Community Coach Modules Level 1 during the month of November.

These workshops engaged a good number of coaches with up to 15 coaches attending from Netball North Harbour, Waitakere Netball Centre and Papakura Netball Centre. Completing these modules will stand them in good stead to continue their coach learning journey in 2024.

A key component in achieving the Netball New Zealand Community Coach Award Level 1 is the completion of the Sport Tutor online modules as well as the practical components at a face-to-face workshop. Workshops available include Player Centered Coaching, Attack, Defence, Building Effective Relationships, Selecting, Skills Analysis, Shooting, Team Culture, Planning, Learning to Umpire and NetballSmart Modules.

The modules are designed to ensure we take a holistic approach to coaching and physical literacy and to enhance the understanding of what it means to be a player / athlete centred coach and to provide coaches with key tools to enable them to deliver meaningful player centred practices.

Workshops take place regularly throughout the Zone and are usually promoted on the Zone and Centre Websites, monthly newsletters, and Facebook.

We look forward to seeing you at a module in 2024.

Coach Developer Hui – Celebrating 2023

At the Northern Zone we are very blessed to have dedicated, passionate Coach Developers. On Sunday, the 3rd December, when most of us were relaxing with whanau or doing some Christmas shopping, sixteen Coach Developers came together to celebrate the great work that was achieved in 2023 and do some mahi around delivering workshops more effectively and efficiently. One of the things identified in 2023 was some Coach Developers struggled to deliver workshops in the timeframes set out. Ironically on the day we did not complete everything on the agenda.

One way we can be better effective at delivering modules is to encourage everyone involved in netball to join Sport Tutor. Sport Tutor has some very good resources, information and activities for trainings, and the online modules are the pre-requisite for the NNZ Coach Framework face to face modules. It also covers Netball Smart, gives you a key understanding of the rules and it will help you to develop your netball knowledge. It is designed for everyone involved in Netball.

Celebrations for 2023 was a result of 859 coaches attending NNZ futureFERNS modules, 737 coaches attending NNZ Community Coach Workshops, 22 coaches were awarded the NNZ Community Coach Award Level 1, and 5 coaches were awarded the NNZ Community Coach Award Level 2. If that wasn't enough to celebrate there were also 318 coaches that attended other learning and development opportunities not included in the NNZ Framework.

Thank you to our awesome Coach Developers in our Zone, that helped support coaches with their coaching journey and encouraged attendance at workshops. You are true champions of Netball!
