NZ Herald Article: An open letter from an umpire to players and supporters

It's a dark cold night as I say goodbye to my children and my husband to go and take part in netball, the sport I love. I will miss them and the guilt of not being at home with them engulfs me once more.

But I love the sport I've chosen because I know I can always improve. I'm not at the top of Everest, I don't think any athlete like me ever will be. We are forever evolving, learning, sympathising, reflecting. How could we have done better? How could we have prepared better? Did I make the right call? I wish I hadn't called that. Oh no! that was an error (I'm going to try harder next time). Such is the life of an umpire or referee in your sport.

For so many who stand on the sideline as spectators, I think most of them are too afraid to pick up a whistle for the exact reason I have outlined. That they will be ridiculed, harassed, heckled, laughed at, shouted at, or spoken about behind their backs during or after the game.

But hey, guess what? I'll let you in on a little secret... we are human, just like you. Have you ever made a mistake before? We strive to give 100 per cent every time, we strive to be fair and to officiate in the spirit of the game, to the best of our ability. But sometimes one or both teams believe us to have different intentions. Like we're out to rob them.

Can I let you in on another secret? We really aren't. We're there to serve our community in a task that is rarely wanted to be undertaken by a spectator. Often the most experienced player will balk at the idea of having to umpire or referee a game. Go on – ask them! I think it might scare them to think they might get it wrong.

Yet umpires and referees turn up each week with their battle armour on, mentally preparing, physically preparing... trying to fill the position of those very few willing to do so. We cop it from players, from the sideline. But the worst of it – and most tragic of all – we cop it from ourselves when we return home reflecting on the job we all volunteered to do. We are our worst critic.

We analyse everything after a game: our mistakes, from the smallest comment to the filthiest of looks. But we still turn up the following week to do it all over again.

Do you know why? Because we love the sport we've chosen. It is challenging and rewarding; we learn every time we go out on the court or field – just like the players. Each game is like a dictionary filling us with new knowledge that we can apply to our next game. How can we improve? What should we have done, or done better? And each and every time ... resolving to be better. We already know. We don't need to hear it from you.

'What happens if all umpires and referees just stop?' But sadly, I'm at the end of my tether, I don't know if I can continue; they (the players) don't like my decisions. Maybe I should stop?

But what happens if all umpires and referees just stop? What if we all put our whistles away for the very last time? What will the players do then? Who will control the game? Will the players just work it out with a friendly discussion or maybe do paper-scissors-rock over every single decision?

You may think it's just your game and the umpire or referee in that game that is affected by your comments. But it's every game after that that makes volunteers like me consider choosing another sport, a sport less conflicting, with more praise and still the same reflection and drive we all crave in sport.

Please, next time you think to provide your opinions to an umpire or referee calls, think about who you might want to control the game you play (or spectate) in one, five or 10 years time. Is it going to be you? Perhaps, because no one else dare to take the court or field as an official in your presence?

I've seen so many of us come and go. Worn down by the constant scrutiny of the players and the sideline. Don't let this weekend's appearance by officials in that game you play or watch be the last of another official to the sport we all love. Enough is enough.

Love. Support. Cherish. All those involved in the game. It's just that, a game.

NetballSmart recently attended the Field Days tournament in Whangarei and although the weather wasn't ideal all the teams were out in the rain giving their best efforts. Whangarei Netball centre set up a NetballSmart court on court 1 where teams could come and do activities, warm-ups, and recovery if needed. NetballSmart ran Mass warmups throughout the day which proved very popular for the year 7&8 teams. The first warm-up of the day had 6 teams involved which really brought the energy.

Northern Wairoa were especially keen learners, they did 3 warm-ups with us and improved each time. Seeing young athletes take control of their own warm-ups is great to see and will set them up to become great athletes in the future.

(PCQ). An outstanding achievement by both coaches!

There are two parts to achieving the NNZ Community Coach Award Level 2: You first need to complete all the CCA 1` modules both online ad practical components and include:

Player Centered Coaching, Planning, Team Culture, Shooting, Building Effective Relationships, Skills Analysis, Attack & Defence Modules

The Community Coach Award Level 2 also requires you to complete online and practical components. They include, *Developing Physical Literacy, Introduction to Mental Skills, Through-court, Tournament Planning, Centre Pass on Attack and Defence, Circle Work, Introduction to Game Analysis, and a practical coach observation as well as the online Netball Smart and Umpire Modules.*

Learning is an ongoing process and to those coaches that want to continue to GROW, Netball New Zealand also offer the Performance Coach Award.

To apply to this programme, coaches need to have completed the NNZ CCA modules or CCQ and you are required to have completed a minimum of two observations at a competency level or higher.

Coaches also need to provide a written testimonial from a player, your Centre and be endorsed by your Zone. Without doubt it is challenging, however it is doable as Jody has proven. She has demonstrated dedication, diligence, and determination to Netball, and we are very grateful to her.

The Northern Zone is dedicated to supporting you on your coaching journey. We encourage you to take part in the various learning opportunities that are taking place around the Zone.

Netball Northern Zone Coach Squad

Netball Northern Zone is excited to work with 19 coaches who have been confirmed to join our new Coach Squad initiative, following submission of an Express of Interest.

Netball Northern Zone are undertaking work in the transition space with a focus on coaches. The transition space is the stepping-stone and link between community and performance. In the coaching sense it is envisaged to build an active group of coaches who are currently coaching at Premier club or Secondary School, U18 or Opens Representative, or NNL level, who aspire to higher honours, are coaching ANZ Premiership players in their club teams, or have a desire and mindset of continuous learning. The Coach Squad will help identify and establish a foundation base of coaching needs within our Zone.

This initiative extends some of the connection work this year that provided opportunities for Coaches to experience ANZP level training sessions, and engage coaches in completing the CCA1 and CCA2 Netball NZ Coach qualifications.



Community Coach Observation Workshop – February 2023

The Netball Northern Zone Coach Squad will be provided with opportunities to engage with Zone led coach sessions with MG Mystics coaching personnel, Zone led NNL level programs like the NZEPP program, Zone led Development Days and any other coaching initiatives that arise. It is envisaged the Coach Squad will provide peer to peer support and mentoring and complete a Personal Development Plan for the 2024 season.
